Friends of the Rainforest will talk about the connections between St. Louis and the Children's Eternal Rainforest in Costa Rica. From the migratory birds that travel from Missouri to Central America, to things you can do in your own backyard to support and protect the incredible biodiversity in the Rainforest, we are all more connected than you may think! You may not think your actions in your local communities can help protect the Rainforest, but even our smallest efforts can have a huge impact!

The void left behind contributes to the climate crisis we experience today. We need more trees to hold the soil in place during heavy floods. We need more trees to sequester the additional carbon in air. We need more trees to shade our cities and absorb heat while cooling the air. We need more trees to connect people to nature in a way that inspires them to do better.

Historically, when we think about our energy supply, we think of transporting oil, gas and coal from across the country and the world, burning them at energy plants outside urban centers, and transporting that energy across miles of power lines to end users. But increasingly, solar has presented opportunities for localized energy grids, where a significant portion of energy is produced in the same neighborhoods where it is used. Distributed energy grids provide benefits over the traditional centralized model - in terms of clean energy, energy reliability, financial savings, community energy sovereignty and more.
